Just looking at the first few newsletters it is evident that sport was a real feature of the school with many towerball, cricket and football match reports - some of these featuring children who are now parents at the school! There are a selection of cricket reports featuring Neil Edwards who later went on to play for Somerset in his teens. London visits were always a feature and another thing which has been maintained over the years.

In February 1994 the newsletter invites parents to pre-school sessions at St Piran's Hall. And then over the following weeks, the governors begin to meet to discuss having a pre-school on the school site - of course this is now Sunny Corner.


January 'Feast Concerts' were a big event on the school calendar, and the newsletters list the children who took part. I wonder which of our parents can remember us being 'mini-Spice Girls'?;-). The PTA was still a driving force and disco's and Fayres were seen as much as community events as fundraising ones, as they are now.

When trawling through the newsletters, I couldn't help being drawn towards the first one when I started teaching at St Hilary - 6th September 1996. In his welcome to myself and a fellow 'new recruit', Bill "hopes that we will be very happy here". I'm guessing the fact that I'm still here certainly means that this was the case! Reading through the newsletters has certainly made me smile and reflect, but to be no less proud of being part of such a great school community. Whilst we wouldn't want the old file to be removed from the school, if anyone would like to pop in for a look through then you would be very welcome!


SCHOOL MEALS 5 FOR 4
